We also ring methods on the back 8 and 10 depending on who comes along. Last month we managed some lovely Stedman on the back 8.

There is to be an EGM (Extraordinary General Meeting) on 3rd March, this is to review and comment on proposed changes to the Association rules (details below)

Notice of Extraordinary General Meeting of the Association – 3 March 2023

Notice is hereby given of an Extraordinary Meeting of the Norwich Diocesan Association of Ringers (NDAR) to be held at 7pm on Friday 3 March 2023 online via Zoom (zoom link to follow).

The objective of the meeting is to give all members to opportunity to review and comment upon proposed changes to the Association rules. At the end of the meeting, those present will be asked to vote on a resolution agreeing to the proposed amendments being put to the Association AGM on 29 April 2023 for final approval.

Members unable to attend the meeting may submit comments for consideration by the meeting to this email address (webmaster@ndar.org.uk). They can also request that the Association President vote on their behalf on the resolution at the end of the meeting. If presenting a written submission to the meeting, members are asked to clearly explain the issue or feedback they are presenting and, if appropriate, the alternative approach they are proposing.

The key changes being proposed at this meeting can be summarised as follows:

- 1. Remove unnecessary, redundant and anomalous aspects of the current set of rules. Also, simplify some of the language which, in parts, has been difficult to interpret.
- 2. More generally reflect the fact that the environment in which the Association operates has changed radically in recent years and many of the old structures are simply not appropriate to the operation of a modern ringing association.
- 3. Allow branches to more freely self-manage themselves as the branch members feel fit, rather than mandating the current structures and meeting schedules which, in the case of several branches, do not reflect the current "modus operandi".
- 4. Clarify the requirements for the Association to hold Annual General Meetings and the way these meetings are managed. Also, the process by which members can be nominated to become Association officers.
- 5. Rename Standing Committee to the Management Committee. Also, clarify how the Management Committee operates, sets ups and empowers sub-committees.
- 6. Clarify and simplify the process for ringers wishing to become members of the Association.
- 7. Rationalise membership categories. In particular, remove the concept of Non-Resident Life Member which has become somewhat redundant.
- 8. Given the move to much information now being available in "real time" on the Association website, simplify the "mandated" content of Association annual reports.
- 9. Clarify how subscriptions are collected to reflect centralised collection as was implemented this year.
- 10. Remove peals from the Association rules and create a new Association Peals Policy

At the end of this EGM, the following resolution will be voted on:

This meeting agrees to the proposed new set of Association Rules (together with any amendments agreed at this meeting), being presented to the Association AGM on 29 April 2023 for final approval.

Why Should I be a member of the Association?

Recently I have been asked this as I ask people to pay the £15 membership contribution. And it is a good question. In the past membership gave you a paper report to collect dust on your bookshelf. Branches would organise meetings with tea - usually – and possibly some ringing that you wouldn't get at your local tower. It would arrange a meeting where you could listen to rule changes in which you didn't have the slightest interest and couldn't really fathom the need for. Sometimes a Training Day would be organised. If you were lucky there would be something you wanted to develop. You were even luckier if the venue was within 30 miles of you. So why should you be a member of the Association? Well ...

I have been advocating radical change. We are members of a RINGING association so surely our Association should be facilitating ringing activities that are needed by ringers in an area that is 'close' to them that will be beneficial to them and others that they ring with. And maybe, just maybe, the Association can support and fund these gatherings to a beneficial level. These events should be facilitated by the Association but not necessarily led by them. A program of events could be planned that will meet members' needs. However it would require members to say what they want. There would need to be a demand for an event from a number of ringers rather than a solitary member. For this the Association leaders should point you in the right direction and maybe prepare the way.

Some ideas that I have had for this are as follows: skill based practices such as Hunting and Dodging or Raising and Lowering; method development practices such as the current Doubles and Minor or the Saturday Surprise Practice; hosting an Open Day with ideas of

what to do and what to include; tower maintenance skills for all; ringing festivals. There are more possibilities - you will just have to wait and see or even better ASK.

The Association would in effect become a 'Needs Facilitator' rather than a "Needs Provider."

Peek through the Door: Wymondham

In order to peek through our door, you'll have to climb the formidable 92 steps to the ringing chamber a reflection of the imposing height of the tower. Ringing on Tuesday nights and Sunday mornings usually commences with ringers staggering through the door, wheezing and breathless from the climb. Once recovered we usually discover that we have enough to ring on eight bells but often on ten and occasionally with a small surplus.

We have a light, airy ringing chamber, again a reflection of the size of the tower. The windows are sufficiently large (and clean) that we have been known to ring around midsummer until 9pm without requiring lights. Our staple on Sunday morning is rounds and call changes on 8 or 10, but we are beginning to venture into Plain Bob Triples or Major if the right combination of ringers is around.

On practice night we ring from rounds and call changes to Surprise Major (Cambridge, Yorkshire or Bristol) and recently we have ventured into Double Norwich. We ring on anything from 6 to 10 bells, including occasionally ringing on 7 or 9!

Teaching takes place away from the practice night – our latest learner had lessons on Saturday morning until he reached the point where he was able to ring rounds when he started attending practice night and, now, Sunday morning ringing.

In September, we enjoyed a lovely tower outing in Suffolk.

The after practice debrief is also well attended: usually in The Green Dragon, a short walk from The Abbey. The discussion there is wide ranging: ringing issues of course, but the environment, steam railways, the history of Wymondham and the use of lion poo to keep cats out of the garden have all been debated recently.

You are welcome to join us. Only remember we start at 7.30 sharp – it's a long way down to open the door!

The Mancroft Ringing Discovery Centre offers a varied programme of targeted practices.

We seem to be nice and busy at the moment, I'll do a guick summary of What's On

Saturday morning at 9.30 to 11am we have a <u>Beginners' session</u>. We will teach from scratch but also look after those who can ring independently and are starting to ring rounds. We use simple exercises to improve bell control and the training bells help the new ringers gain confidence. We have ART trained teachers looking after things.

Tuesday Lunchtime 12-1pm <u>Introduction to change ringing</u>. This session is tutor led session is for those learning Plain Hunt, Dodging and Call Changes.

Wednesday 5.30-6.30pm is <u>Young Ringers</u>. Some are very young! A group of around 12 enthusiastic ringers, we offer everything from learning to handle a bell to Surprise. It's huge fun and very loud!

Thursday 12-1pm Method Ringing. A variety of methods are covered, Treble Bob, Stedman, or Principles, depends on the week. It is all listed on our website.

Friday <u>Simulator session</u>- ring any method you like on any number of bells with the perfect band. You can even choose the ring of bells that you would like to hear. (12-2pm) Please check before turning up.

In addition to the regular weekly sessions we also run a monthly <u>Surprise Major Practice</u>, and a monthly <u>Pickled Egg Practice/quarter peal</u>. We have recently linked up with Norwich School to form an after-school club.
